The WACG Board met briefly after the November program, a thoughtful and enjoyable presentation by Charles Clary of CCU. His organically inspired works are done with paper constructs.

The Board approved the inclusion of Myrtle Beach art teacher Olivia Thornton on the Board. Our two new members will serve in an interim capacity until approval by guild members in December. Treasury matters were discussed including the receipt of \$81, from a commission on a work sold at the Member's Show in October. Tom Britton reported a savings of approximately \$1000 on expenses for that show.

We worked out the details of the December meeting, which will feature a panel of long time members Dixie Dugan, Alex Powers, Phyllis Dunn, and Elaine Bigelow discussing their recollections of the Guild's past. It will be videotaped and included in our digital historical records project.

Kathy Britton and I took the art supplies that members have so generously donated over the last couple of months, to the Boys and Girls Clubs of Myrtle Beach. They were thrilled to have the supplies, and very appreciative of the Guild's support. Since they have a need for art supplies for their summer programs, we are considering another drive during the spring meetings. We welcome any feedback from our members pertaining to this project.

The last Art in the Park (until spring) was very successful, according to the vendors. Our next opportunity to show and sell will be the home show in February. Until then, we hope to see you at our monthly meetings.

Looking Back ...

(A continuation of the museum story from November.)

Faced with the dilemma of moving Springmaid Villa, the guild obtained gifts of \$10,000 (from the family of Ann Springs Close, who had once owned the house) and \$5000 (from Grand Strand realtor Mac McLeod) to cover the cost.

Myrtle Beach Mayor Eric Ficken saw an opportunity for the city to support the arts, and in February 1984, the city worked out details to move the villa to a parking lot behind J. Pepper Geddings Recreation Center on Oak Street, but stopped short of making a financial commitment.

Various routes were considered. The Highway 17 Bypass was rejected because of high voltage lines. Coming straight down Ocean Blvd. would be cost prohibitive due to cutting and repairing wires. Kings Highway (17 Business) would be difficult because of the number of electric lines crossing the street. Moreover, side streets would have to be wide enough to accommodate the 45 foot wide girth.

Before a move could start, however, the city demanded that everyone should be allowed to use the building. Some within the Guild balked at that, as WACG Board member Bill Keener observed, "I am sure a few in the Guild wanted to keep the house under their control."

Thus the Pepper Geddings site fell through.

Other Show / Event Info

The Myrtle Beach Art Museum is hosting some interesting programs this fall. These should be of interest to all of our members. Shows currently in progress through January 7, 2016 include:

"Indigo" Works in Denim by Jim Arendt. Indigo was one of South Carolinas most important cash crops during the colonial period. The leaves could be processed and fermented to create blue dye (the official state color) that was the color of American military uniforms during the Revolutionary War. Indigo dye was also used to create denim fabric. For Myrtle Beach artist Jim Arendt, Assistant Professor and Gallery Director at Coastal Carolina University, denim is tinged with the bitterness of the work of enslaved Africans. "Indigo" is a celebration of the tenacity and resilience of people and exhibits Arendt's works constructed of layered, cut pieces of varying shades of denim.

"Rice" Paintings by Jonathan Green It is called Carolina Gold Rice because it was the cash crop of colonial South Carolina's agricultural economy. South Carolina artist Jonathan Green presents a collection of drawings and paintings representative of the America's African descendants whose agricultural knowledge and skill propelled South Carolina's colonial plantation economy.

Remnants of the Rice Culture by David Shriver Soliday features aerial photography of retired but still visible rice fields in the South Carolina Lowcountry. Soliday, of Charleston South Carolina, presents his photographs, printed on infused aluminum, that provide a unique perspective into the incredible skill and expertise required to create the system of dikes and canals associated with the rice fields.

Also, available through December 27th -

Contemporary Conversations II is one half of a two part exhibit featuring a collection of works by 95 contemporary South Carolina artists. The exhibit is designed to suggest the quality and diversity of the state's cultural heritage. Contemporary Conversations includes everything from hard-edge geometric abstraction to surrealist-tinged dreamscapes. The Art Museum will exhibit 37 works from Contemporary Conversations II (CCII) and one additional piece from CCI.

Other Show Info

Coastal Carolina University presents Portfolios: Senior Exhibition Fall 2015. Graduating seniors from the Department of visual Arts including Graphic Design and Art Studio present their thesis exhibition "Portfolios" from December 4th to the 12th. There is not much time to catch this impressive show in the Rebecca Randall Bryan Gallery on campus in room 129 of the Edwards College on 133 Chanticleer Drive W. The gallery is open from 9:00 am to 5 pm Monday through Friday and from noon to 4:00 pm Saturday December 12th. This is always an interesting show so you might want to check it out.

The Waccamaw Art Center (formerly referred to as the Waccamaw Mall Gallery) is displaying works by local artists and Chinese artists at the old Waccamaw Pottery Facility. If you haven't seen it you may wish to visit this gallery which is located across from the Clarion Hotel. There is currently an opportunity for artists to display at this venue. There is a jurying process. Work must be original art only and 2-D work should be framed and in good condition. There is no fee to display in the gallery, however, a 40% commission will apply to all sales and everyone must host the gallery at least 1 day/month (current requirement). Hosts will have an opportunity to earn commission of 5-10% of items sold. If this sounds interesting to you come by the gallery and check it out.
